PACT Priorities

- Crime Prevention for Allotments sites after a series of burglaries and some damage (agreed 25 targeted patrols)
- No right turn, Church Hill, Coleshill (agreed 25 targeted patrols)

Community Priorities

- Warwickshire Police is obliged to protect communities from harm in line with the 'Police Priorities'.
- This may mean that in exceptional circumstances SNT officers may be required to work on other policing priorities.
- If this happens there will be a need to re-negotiate priorities. This will be done in liaison with the Chair and the panel.

Anti-Social Behaviour Ansley Common

- Target of 20 patrols achieved 62
- Previous ¼ 12 incidents reported, this ¼ 14 calls but 11 of these were silent 9's
- worked with NWBC and Youth Services
- Reactive units have been patrolling locations
- Young people in the vicinity have been spoken to and advised about acceptable behaviour. None caught in act of ASB.
- 2 Section 59's issued

Anti social behaviour

- Brett's Hall recreation ground, Ansley Common

Multiagency (Parish Council, Police, Borough Council,

Warwickshire County Council, LEY project) meeting to look at

issues at the recreation ground. Actions included;

- High visibility Policing
- The installation an infra red CCTV
- Planning permission applied for, decision awaited
- Youth activities on Friday evening
- -Weather prevented/ reduced additional issues occurring, plans in place if the issue arises again in the spring.
- Promoting reporting via the new 101
- Promotion of Neighbourhood watch, dog watch etc

Safer Neighbourhoods

101 is now the number to call when you want to contact your local police – when it's less urgent than 999.

When should I call 101?

To report less urgent crime or disorder and for general police enquiries. For example;

- if your car has been stolen;
- if your property has been damaged;
- when you suspect drug use or dealing;
- · to report a minor traffic collision;
- to give the police information about crime in your area; or
- if you'd like to speak to your local police officer.

How does it work?

You can call 101 to contact your local police force. The service is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. For more information visit www.police.uk/101

What does it cost me to call?

Calls from landlines and mobile networks cost 15 pence per call, no matter what time of day or how long you are on the phone.

Can I call 101 if I'm deaf, hard of hearing, speech impaired, or if English is not my first language?

Yes, If you are deaf, hard of hearing or speech impaired you can textphone 18001 101. If you have difficulty speaking English, your local police can access interpreters who can translate your call.

Remember, in an emergency always call 999.

For example this is when you need an immediate response because a crime is in progress; someone suspected of a crime is nearby; when there is danger to life or when violence is being used or threatened.

- There will be limited SNT responsibility for investigating crimes or attending incidents. Incident response will be provided by teams based at Bedworth and Rugby.
- All investigations will be conducted by investigation teams based at the Criminal Justice Centre (CJC) Nuneaton.
- •4 x 'Harms Teams' across the county 1 x PS & 8 PC's to be allocated specific tasks by SNT's across the county. SNT Beat Managers will put in bids for their services. They will also carry out proactive duties.
