2014/15 Budget Consultation

1 Summary

1.1 This report presents a questionnaire for use in consulting on the Council's budget for 2014/15.

Recommendation to the Sub-Group

That the questionnaire is approved for inclusion in North Talk.

2 Introduction

- 2.1 Work has started on the preparation of the Council's budget for 2014/15. As part of this exercise, consideration has been given to the consultation to be undertaken.
- 2.2 It is some years since a wider consultation exercise was carried out. An issue of North Talk is due out at the end of November, which could be used to distribute a questionnaire to residents of the Borough.

3 Consultation Proposed

- 3.1 A questionnaire on the services that the Council provides has been drafted and is attached at Appendix A. The front page aims to put the Council's financial position into context, whilst the remaining pages seek views about which services resident's value and the level of council tax increase they would be prepared to pay. There are also opportunities to make additional comments on the budget and services.
- 3.2 It is proposed to include the questionnaire in the middle of North Talk, so it can be pulled out. Further work will be done on the page layout, so that the address and a freepost number can be put on the final page. This would allow residents to send the questionnaire back without an envelope. Alternatively, the questionnaire gives the option for residents to complete the survey on the Council's website.

4 Report Implications

4.1 Finance and Value for Money Implications

4.1.1 There will be an additional cost of printing and delivery amounting to £2,250. There will also be a cost for any questionnaires returned by Freepost, but this will depend on the level of responses. The Consultation budget will be used to cover these additional costs.

Your chance to have your say about next year's budget

The Council Tax you pay is just part of the income we use to fund Borough Council services. The rest comes from fees and charges – for example, for using our leisure centres or arranging bulky waste collections - and also from a grant from Central Government. It's this last area that has been cut over the years and it's even more than we expected for 2014/15.

So, the Council is facing some tough times ahead and now it's your chance to have your say. On the next few pages, we've listed our services, some of which we have to provide by law. We're asking you whether we should cut spending or introduce or increase charges.

We're very fortunate in North Warwickshire in that, up to now, we've protected our key services and still provide free car parking and a free Borough Care 'lifeline' service for people over 62. We've also managed to freeze the level of Council Tax for the last two years. But this may have to change and this is where your views count.

Here are some financial facts to help you with the questionnaire

We send out the Council Tax bills every year but Borough Council services only amount to **13%** of the total. Here's the breakdown for 2013/14.

The Borough Council's share is £3,963,870. Put simply, someone living in a Band D property will pay £207.30 in 2013/14 or just £3.99 a week.

We reduced the 2010/11 Band D charge of £209.39 by 1% in 2011/12 and froze it at £207.30 for the following two years. This meant that income to pay for services was reduced by £285,000 each year.

As we've said, the grant from Central Government has reduced in recent years and will continue to do so, putting more pressure on our finances. We received £5.102 million in 2010/11 but we are only expecting £3.207 million for 2014/15. This is an overall reduction of £1.895 million or a massive 37%.

We've managed to cope so far by reducing our spending on goods and services, sharing services with other councils and not filling vacant posts. Since 2010/11, we've shaved off just over £2 million but we now need your help to decide what we do next.

QUESTION 2 Council Tax

Council Tax has been frozen or reduced by the Borough Council for the last three years. The Borough Council is planning to increase Council Tax by 2% for 2014/15 and the following three years. The Council Tax bill for Borough Council services in 2013/14 is currently £207.30 per year for a Band D property. An increase of 2% will mean an average increase in Council Tax of £4.15 per year (8p per week) on that bill.

Every additional 1% increase in Council Tax generates an additional £39,580 of income over the next four years and reduces our total savings requirement. Every additional 1% costs each household in a band D property on average an additional £2.07 per year (4p per week) on their Council Tax bill.
